Highlights

Nearly four months after the 7.7 magnitude earthquake that struck central Myanmar, UNHCR and humanitarian actors continue to assist communities remaining in need for assistance in the affected areas. Seasonal flooding continued to be reported in different parts of the country, heightening some pre-existing vulnerabilities and adding another layer of challenges, particularly in the area of shelter.

UNHCR continues its outreach efforts while balancing the security and access situation and the delivery of key activities, including essential relief items and shelter support.

To date, over 134,000 people have received assistance from UNHCR and partners. More than 141,000 have been reached through protection monitoring and assessments, which continue to guide targeted support for the most vulnerable, including those with specific needs.



UNHCR Response

- In Mandalay and Sagaing, UNHCR reached 93,104 people (20,445 families) to date, including 22,875 people (5,723 families) who received multi-purpose assistance. During the past two weeks UNHCR distributed core-relief items and shelter kits, including for people with disabilities, in Mandalay and surrounding areas. The team is also working with partners to assess community buildings renovation.
- According to recent assessments at several monasteries in Mandalay hosting earthquakeaffected people, while core-relief items, multipurpose assistance and food has been provided by humanitarian actors, the needs still persist especially for shelter, including tents for temporary learning space, as well as alternative shelter solutions for severely damaged households.
- In Nay Pyi Taw, UNHCR has assisted 9,843 people (2,092 families) to date. UNHCR and partners are preparing the next round of corerelief items distribution to take place during the last week of July in Tatkon Township.
- In the South-East, 31,092 people (6,959 families) have received assistance to date, including 5,104 people (1,197 families) who received multipurpose assistance.
- Similarly, UNHCR and partners are conducting household surveys for multi-purpose assistance targeting 2,500 families, and shelter assistance for some 600 families.

Immediate Needs

With support from donors, UNHCR continues providing life-saving assistance to those affected by the earthquake in Myanmar, but needs remain high, especially in light of the current monsoon season. Learn more about UNHCR appeal and how you can support:

Provide emergency shelter kits (including plastic tarpaulin, ropes, and other essential materials) to enable people to live in safe and dignified shelters, particularly in light of the upcoming monsoon season.



Deliver immediate emergency CRIs, including sleeping mats, blankets, kitchen sets, mosquito nets, buckets, and solar lamps, as well as multipurpose assistance to support earthquake-affected populations.



Strengthen access to protection services, including communication with communities, legal assistance, psychosocial support, and targeted interventions for Persons with Specific Needs, including children, women, Elderly People, and Persons with Disabilities.



Protection Mainstreaming

UNHCR continued to conduct protection monitoring and assessments to identify the needs of earthquake-affected communities and to inform response planning across several impacted areas.

Mandalay and Sagaing

UNHCR, in collaboration with civil society organization, continued to carry out a site visits to assess
locations for the installation of community tents aimed to serve as temporary learning spaces for
children supported by this partner.

Nay Pyi Taw

- UNHCR and partners conducted two Rapid Protection Assessments in Tract, Tatkon Township, reaching over 900 earthquake-affected people (221 families). Key findings indicated that shelter and multi-purpose assistance remain critically needed.
- A partner organization provided a protection awareness session to 10 volunteers covering several key protection topics including Child Protection, Gender and Diversity (AGD), Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) and UNHCR Hotline.

South-East

 Information, Education and Communication (IEC) materials including 100 pamphlets on Child Protection, Civil Documentation, PSEA, Gender-Based Violence (GBV) and UNHCR Helpline were distributed.

Coordination and Partnerships

 For the earthquake response, UNHCR co-leads the Protection Cluster with the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC), and jointly leads the Shelter/Non-Food Item (NFI) and Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster with the International Federation of the Red Cross (IFRC).

Financial Information

UNHCR's total funding requirements for Myanmar in 2025 stand at USD 88.3 million. As of the end of June, only 32% of funding had been secured. UNHCR is grateful for the generosity of donors who have stepped forward with earmarked contributions for Myanmar, as well as those providing flexible funding globally ensuring life-saving assistance reaches those most in need.


