Dear Reader,

On 24th October, the United Nations celebrated UN Day on the organization's 75th anniversary. Recognizing the many global, inter-connected, challenges the world continues to face, added to by the global health crisis caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, this year the UN Secretary-General had decided to mark our anniversary by stimulating a broad, inclusive, conversation on the future we – the Peoples that make up the United Nations - want and the UN we need.

Within the constraints to meet in person caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, over the last few weeks we have engaged on this theme through virtual platforms with government officials, diplomats, academics, public health experts, youth, LGBTIQ representatives and many more to discuss a shared vision for the UN. The voices of young people are of course particularly important when discussing the future of the United Nations. Moving forward the UN Country Team has decided to further strengthen our engagement with youth in Myanmar, something we all look forward to.

While calling for global solidarity and cooperation to deal with the COVID pandemic, the UN Secretary-General also reiterated another important message on UN Day – his call for a global ceasefire. This call is also relevant for Myanmar and I still hope all parties to conflict will heed the Secretary-General's call, and find the space and a process to arrive at lasting peace in all areas still suffering the consequences of conflict. Looking forward, on 25th November, UN agencies will come together through 16 Days of Activism to raise awareness about the need to end violence against women and girls. I am looking forward to working with UN agencies and partners to support this campaign and amplify its message.

Lastly, with national elections less than a week away, I encourage all my national UN colleagues to exercise

their democratic right and duty to cast their vote, to apply all necessary COVID precautions in doing so – keep your distance, don't forget your mask, sanitize your hands among them - and I express my hope and wishes for a peaceful election day as Myanmar continues on its democratic journey.

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WFP launches domestic flights in Myanmar to support COVID-19 response and humanitarian operations

A United Nations chartered flight, operated by the World Food Programme (WFP), departed from Yangon October 24 transporting medical supplies and front-line aid workers to support the COVID-19 response and humanitarian operations in Rakhine State. WFP arranged this humanitarian flight because domestic commercial air services have been temporarily suspended in Myanmar in September, as part of the Government's efforts to control COVID-19 transmissions. Moreover, access by road and sea between Yangon and Sittwe is currently not practically feasible.

Another flight was arranged on October 31 and the next flight will be November 14.

UNICEF Myanmar expresses deep sorrow over the death of a boy killed by an explosive device

UNICEF Myanmar expresses deep sorrow over the death of a boy who was killed by an explosive device, launched by an unidentified armed element, on Monday 19th October in Mrauk-U, Rakhine State. UNICEF is deeply concerned about the alarming increase in reports of killings and injuries of children as a result of intensified fighting between the Tatmadaw and the Arakan Army (AA) in Rakhine State.

The safety and rights of children must be the primary consideration in all contexts. UNICEF strongly urges all parties to conflict to take all necessary measures to protect children and keep them out of harm's way, including by protecting civilian facilities from the impact of conflict.

As Myanmar continues to work to tackle COVID-19, UNICEF urges all parties to conflict to exercise maximum restraint and to intensify efforts to ensure that children affected by the pandemic and the protracted conflict continue to have access to humanitarian assistance and services.

Our thoughts go to the families of the victims and to all children who remain in harm's way.

The United Nations General Assembly designated 31st of October as World Cities Day, by a resolution, in 2013. The Day promote the international community's interest in global urbanization, push forward cooperation among countries in meeting opportunities and addressing challenges of urbanization, and contributing to sustainable development goals around the world. The 2020 Theme is Valuing Our Communities and Cities. It afforded an opportunity to reflect on our cities informal settlements and consider their future in light of the impact of COVID 19 and its social, political and financial upheavals.

The event was graced by the presence of His Excellency U Han Zaw, the Union Minister of the Ministry of Construction. Members of the National Urban Committee; senior officials and advisors from Department of Urban and Housing Development; development partners; representatives from Embassies, UN agencies; professional associations and Urban professionals. 
ILO: Collapsing demand amid lock downs cripple Asia-Pacific garment industry

Gender-based violence actors to improve coordination during COVID-19

UNODC and UNFPA organized the Multi-agency Round-table on Gender-based Violence Response Coordination in the Context of COVID-19 on October 16th in light of the increasing need to address the GBV prevention and response challenges which have resulted from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Round-table brought together senior representatives from the Myanmar Government, UN Agencies, and civil society organizations, providing a venue for them to share their experiences addressing GBV, to discuss strategies for increasing GBV coordination, and to develop a strategic action plan for improving responses to GBV in the context of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Participants endorsed closer collaboration moving forward and discussed steps for improving coordination between all actors along the GBV response chain. UNDP donates computer, related equipment to MNHRC

The United Nations Development Programme donated 22 laptops and 11 printers to the Myanmar National Human Rights Commission on 27 and 28 October to be used in the activities of the promotion and protection of human rights in Myanmar.

The computers and related equipment were donated as part of the Strategic Plan 2020-2024 being implemented by the Myanmar National Human Rights Commission and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and Director-General and Commission members accepted the donation.

UN Myanmar supports 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence

The 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence (GBV) will take place under the 2020 theme *Orange the world: Fund, Respond, Prevent, Collect!*

The United Nations Secretary-General's Campaign *UNiTE by 2030 to end violence against women* released the global theme in support of the 2020 campaign activities.

The local effort in Myanmar seeks to strengthen legal frameworks for the passing of the *Protection and Prevention of Violence against Women* (PoVAW) bill including associated policy and service initiatives, and also call for immediate action to respond to GBV in COVID-19 context and beyond, such as more Funding for ending VAW, and more evidence through data collection to better Prevent and Respond to VAW.



The Department of Social Welfare (DSW) - Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement (MoSWRR), Myanmar National Committee on Women (MNCW), UN agencies and NGOs/CSOs have annually organized commemorative events and campaigns on the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women and Girls and its 16-days of activism to call for action to stop violence against women and girls.

The 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence runs from 25 November (International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women) to 10 December (Human Rights Day) and is used as an organizing strategy by individuals and organizations around the world to call for the prevention and elimination of violence against women and girls.

UNEP: Saving the lives of gold miners

The United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) is supporting Myanmar's Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation (MONREC) to develop a National Action Plan to reduce and eventually eliminate mercury use in artisanal and small-scale gold mining.

An [estimated](#) 173,000 people work in Myanmar's artisanal and small-scale gold mining sector. UNEP has been working with the Government of Myanmar to reduce the impact of mercury on miners. Part of this support is building Myanmar's capacity to ratify and implement the [Minamata Convention on Mercury](#), a multilateral environmental agreement that aims to protect human health and the environment from anthropogenic emissions and releases of mercury and mercury compounds.

Conducting the assessment and monitoring compliance with existing regulations requires special equipment. UNEP, in collaboration with the Japan Association for UNEP, donated a mercury meter to the Government of Myanmar from technology company CASIO Japan, which is supporting UNEP's mercury regulation activities.

A [2015 study](#) in Myanmar found that miners had more than twice the amount of mercury in their body compared to non-miners.

MIMU: Information is priceless in Myanmar

The UN information management team responds rapidly to the COVID-19 crisis in Myanmar.



As New Year's 2020 celebrations across the world calmed, unease about COVID-19 skyrocketed. By the end of January, the WHO declared a global health emergency, and the next day, the [Myanmar Information Management Unit](#) (MIMU) launched the [MIMU COVID-19 Webpage](#) to be a central space for situation updates and prevention information. \$600m raised to support humanitarian response in Myanmar, Bangladesh and the Region'

The international community has pledged over US \$600 million as part of an international response to aid Rohingya refugees and host communities in Bangladesh as well as support humanitarian needs in Myanmar and other countries in the region. The new pledges were secured at a [virtual conference](#) on 22 October jointly hosted by the United States, the United Kingdom, the European Union, and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). It addresses a significant funding gap and to considerably expands the nearly USD \$636 million in humanitarian



assistance already committed in 2020 under the Bangladesh Joint Response Plan and the Myanmar Humanitarian Response Plan.

Conference participants emphasized the importance of addressing root causes and for safe, voluntary, dignified, and sustainable solutions for an estimated 860,000 Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh and 600,000 Rohingya individuals that remain in Myanmar's Rakhine State. Additionally, the conference also

advocated for continued humanitarian access and assistance to the some 171,000 internally displaced persons at various locations in Myanmar.

The ILO's *Developing International and Internal Labour Migration Governance* report calls for inclusion of migrants in social protection packages, and greater flexibility to allow migrants to travel to countries of destination to fill existing labour shortages safely and without bearing the costs of quarantine and testing.
